Recently at the Boundless Congress, the World President of Women's Ministries, Commissioner Silvia Cox spoke about the same fact that Women can Change the World. She also encouraged the women to let God use them.

I quote "We the women of The Salvation Army can change the world- One person, One family, One village, One community, One country at a time" she declared to the audience. (Boundless Today issue four).

We all believe in destiny: that God created us for something. Our destiny is not something we ought

to do; it is something we yearn for, that is more fulfilling for us than any other task.

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MISSION STATEMENT OF THE SALVATION ARMY

The Salvation Army, an international movement, is an evangelical part of the universal Christian Church. Its message is based on the Bible. Its ministry is motivated by love for God. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination.





Where were you born and raised?

I was born and raised in Cape Town and am the eldest of 6 children - we are three brothers and three sisters.

Were you raised in a Christian home?

I was raised in a nominal Christian home. We were Methodists when I was growing up and attended the local Methodist church regularly. As children, we hardly missed Sunday school, since we lived just opposite the church and my grandmother, who came to visit every Sunday, made sure that we were in Sunday school and church every Sunday. During those growing up years, when I was just six or seven years old, I remember the Gideonites, doing missionary work in our community, doing door to door visitation, distributing the pocket size red

Gideon Bibles. That's how I got my very own first Bible back then. My parents then opened our home to the Gideonites and so out-reach Sunday school was held in our home for quite some time.

When did you become a Christian?

I became a Christian when I was nine years old. It happened during school holidays, which I spent at my cousins' home. I went along with them to The Salvation Army Matroosfontein Corps in the Western Cape Division where my uncle and aunt Stemmet and Ruth Engelbrecht were Envoys. That was the first time I came into contact with The Salvation Army. I remember very clearly that on that Sunday morning during the senior meeting, I responded to the altar call, knelt at the mercy seat where the Corps Sergeant Major, lead me in a simple prayer to Jesus, whom I accepted into my heart as Lord and Saviour. That first Sunday, was the beginning of a wonderful journey into a new life with Jesus! I fell in love with God and The Salvation Army, and a turbulent transition into The Salvation Army began, for remember, being only 9 years old and belonging to the Methodist church, wasn't going to make this transition any easy!

When and how were you called to officership?

You have heard the expression; "Killing two birds with one stone", or, "which came first, the chicken or the egg?" Well, this was what happened to me! On that Sunday morning, when I gave my heart to Jesus, I also strongly felt the urge "to be a preacher". For the first time, I saw and heard my uncle preach the Bible, I felt a strong urge to respond to the call of God to be his child and to serve him the way my uncle and aunt did! This made the transition into The Salvation Army even more turbulent, but when I look back over all these years, I see the faithfulness of God, who never let go of me. If there were times when I have ever doubted whether I was in the right vocation, or when I faced the struggles of life as a young officer, the Lord always reminded me of the encounter I had with Him on that Sunday morning, when I first met Jesus and answered the call to officership, and the turbulent years, through which He lead

What was your occupation prior to officership?

My final year at High School, was during that intensive year of "the struggle" against inferior education in our country. It was the time of the big "school boycott", which went on for a year and during this time I worked as a volunteer at The Salvation Army Men's Metropole in Cape Town, where my uncle and aunt were the Administrators, whenever there were no classes. I remember we had to watch the newspapers to see whether we were going back to school or whether the boycott was continuing. Following this stint at The Salvation Army Men's hostel, I went into the newspaper industry where I worked at the Cape Times for six years prior to entering into the College for Officer Training.

How did you meet your wife and how many children?

This is a long but beautiful story! A story for another day! Very briefly then. I met my wife at Matroosfontein Corps. It was during our teen years when I suddenly noticed her. I on and off went to The Salvation Army whenever I had the opportunity to do so, or when I had a chance to 'slip away' from home on a Sunday morning, walking down to The Salvation Army, instead of going to the Methodist church opposite our home! During these times I never really noticed her although she was there in the Singing Company all along, and playing in the junior timbrel brigade etc. Then one day, after a long absence from the Army because I was still belonging to the Methodist church, and not allowed to attend the Army any longer, I visited my cousins and, I saw this beautiful young lady 'for the first time' who came to my uncle's place together with her sister, on their way to Bonteheuwel Corps for Company Guard's training, and wow, wow, wow, how could I not have noticed her? The rest is history!

We are married for 31 years and have a son in Cape Town and a daughter living in New Zealand with her husband and we are proud grand parents of two beautiful grandchildren Conrad, who will be two years old in October and Brooklynn who will be a year old in September.

What do you do in your spare time?

I do a bit of reading, love the outdoors, and when we do have the opportunity, do some 'day-driving' to scenic routes, etc.

Where have you previously served?

After commissioning we served in a variety of appointments, which have stretched and broaden our world view of The Salvation Army globally. We



served for three years in Bonteheuwel Corps and nursery school, seven blessed years at Worcester Corps, four years at Mitchells Plain Corps, then on to College staff where I spend two years as Spiritual Formation Officer & Assistant Extension Training Officer and my wife three years as Director for Special Services and Director for Spiritual Formation. I was then appointed as Territorial Public Relations Secretary, and my wife joined me a year later in this department as Assistant Public Relations Secretary. In 2007 we went on International Service to New Zealand as Divisional Programme Secretary and Divisional Personnel Secretary respectively and returned to South Africa in 2010 as Divisional Commander and DDWM of Limpopo Division. From October 2011 to April 2012 we took up appointments as Divisional

Commander and DDWM of the Central Division, after which we went to THQ for a short while (four months!) as Secretary for Programme and Assistant Secretary for Personnel. Appointments to IHQ followed as Under Secretary and Assistant Under Secretary for Africa Zone. These appointments we held for a year, before we were appointed to the Southern Africa territory as Chief Secretary and TSWM.

What is your vision for The Salvation Army in South Africa?

My vision for The Salvation Army is encapsulated in the Territorial Strategic Plan's 1-3-5! I believe The Salvation Army has what it takes to bring transformation to the communities where we are located, and our communities, the country at large, are presenting to us countless opportunities to be what God has purposed for us to be! Our Founder and first General William Booth, uttered his most famous the "I'll Fight" speech a hundred and three years ago and they are still relevant for us here in South Africa today. Yes, my vision for The Salvation Army in South Africa will continue to be that; "The Salvation Army is a vibrant movement with people of integrity, coming alongside communities, enabling growth and transformation of the whole person through the Gospel of Jesus Christ, where every Corps and centre and Salvation Army expression is active in their communities, facilitating transformation, where every Salvationist must be equipped to facilitate transformation and of a Salvation Army that is growing in quality and quantity!" It is my earnest prayer that God will pour out his Holy Spirit afresh upon His Army, bringing revival in the heart and life of every Salvationist, so that The Salvation Army in this beautiful country will truly be what God has called us to be... The Salvation Army!

Do you have a Bible passage or verse that is special to you?

I have quite a few, but there is a particular passage that has always struck a chord with me and it is found in Philippians 2: 1-11. For me, it is important that as brothers and sisters in the Lord, being part of God's family, we must be like Jesus! We must reflect the nature and spirit of our Father! I just want to be like Jesus, in all that I do and God will help me. I want my attitude to be the same as that of Christ! And yes, it is not always easy, but..."I can do all things through Christ, who gives me strength!" (Philippians 4:13). Yes we can..."If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31)

The Salvation Army has Very good policies, procedures, principles and processes in place. How do you envisage instilling these good ministry ethics to your team and beyond so that they are not side tracked and stay focused on the Mission?

We hear a lot about "Corporate Governance". Some years ago the King I, II and King III reports on Corporate Governance in South Africa were issued, which gives impetus in the adhering to good ethical practices in the corporate sector, having good processes and structures to achieve its objectives. As a movement established by God through William Booth, The Salvation Army Southern Africa territory is committed to good governance. We have an obligation to be accountable and transparent towards all our stake holders - those we serve and those who are helping us through their donations to serve the marginalised. You said it very well that we have very good policies, procedures, principles and processes. I strongly advocate the adherence to these and our Orders and Regulations. I have always said it in many a forum, that when we do this we cannot go wrong. We have the tools within our organisation and these are good tools at our disposal. We do not need to go and borrow from others. Accountability and transparency will be key words for me. If we want The Salvation Army to achieve its God-given mandate and its objectives, then every leader at every level in every Salvation Army centre or unit in the territory, must adhere to the principles of good governance, which is enshrined in the Bible, our Orders and Regulations, policies, principles and procedures.

Which Bible character in the Old Testament would you like to spend time

Nehemiah. I have an affinity with Nehemiah. I think Nehemiah can teach me all there is to be learned about Leadership! In this twenty first century, there are many a variety of leadership books by well-known authors and scholars on the market and there is not a scarcity of seminars and workshops on leadership, and they are all good, make no mistake, but century old Nehemiah leadership principles exceeds them all! I would love to "sit at the feet" of Nehemiah!



MORE than 12,000 Salvationists – many of them travelling from the international congress venue at The O2 – poured onto the streets of central London on Sunday 5 July, the final day of Boundless – The Whole World Redeeming.

More than 2,500 participants – between them representing each of the 126 countries which have Salvation Army ministry – marched from Horse Guards Parade down The Mall, towards Buckingham Palace to take the salute from General André Cox, Commissioner Silvia Cox (World President of Women's Ministries), the Chief of the Staff (Commissioner William Roberts) and Commissioner Nancy Roberts (World Secretary for Women's Ministries). From there they headed to Constitution Hill, with the international leaders also marching from the event. The streets were lined with an additional 10,000 Salvationists, friends and members of the public cheering on the celebration.

Organised by Paul Gunnell, Assistant Events Manager for the United Kingdom Territory with the Republic of Ireland, the 45-minute march was led off by an International Headquarters (IHQ) contingent fronted by Commissioner William Cochrane (International Secretary to the Chief of the Staff).



Hundreds of people around the world were able to observe the march via a live webstream from IHQ's Periscope account (sar.my/periscope).

The Army has an extensive history of marching on the streets of London. Its members have marched during previous international congresses – including in 1978 and 1990 – as well as in 2011 for the ISB's 120th anniversary celebration.

Major Carol Horton from Australia was among those cheering on the festivities. 'It's always really exciting to see,' she said. 'It reminds you of how vast the Army is.'

Lieutenant Hean Suk Choi, South Korea native and corps officer in the United Kingdom, likened the march to an openair meeting. 'It's our unique expression to the public to share with everyone the culture of The Salvation Army,' she said.

Her husband, Lieutenant Kook Hwan Rho, added, 'We have been given an opportunity to meet Salvationists from 126 countries, but we feel like there are no strangers. Everyone immediately felt like brothers and sisters.'

Major Russell Czajkowski, San Antonio (Texas) Area Commander from USA Southern Territory, said he was very impressed by the congress's offerings, particularly Session 7.



Seven bands took part – the International Staff Band (ISB), Angola National Band, New York Staff Band, Chicago Staff Band, South America East Territorial Band, the Melbourne Staff Band and Regent Hall Band – as well as timbrelists, soldiers, adherent members and congress staff and volunteers.

'In 1865, The Salvation Army was born on the streets of London,' the General said. 'It is entirely appropriate, then, that we should return to those streets to conclude our 150th anniversary celebrations. We have had a wonderful week of fellowship and worship at The O2 but now – as is our tradition – we want to share our joy and faith outside our own walls.'

'The General's message to submit ourselves was very inspirational,' he said. 'That was my favourite part of Boundless.'

Lieut-Colonel Seth Appeateng (Officer Commanding, Rwanda and Burundi Command) said, 'Everything about the congress was fantastic. My spirit was moved. Now I'm going to call my people to go out onto the streets and share Jesus Christ.'

The General concluded: 'The march marks the end of the anniversary celebrations but it is also a start – a launching point as members of God's Army return to their homes and neighbourhoods across the world, ready to continue serving God and mankind.'

I am writing this article to express my sincere thanks to the ordinary people who worked selflessly to build the work of God and The Salvation Army in Mpumalanga, the then Eastern Transvaal. If it was not for the sacrifice they made and the commitment they had, we would not have what we have today in this great division. Most of these people who contributed and worked tirelessly are in glory, but we are so grateful to God that they left us with such a great legacy. Despite the challenging and trying times, they did not give up. What I am today, I owe it to these heroes and I salute them wherever they are.

In this article I want to share about the work of the four heroes, Envoys Shimungana John Themba (Steenbok), Josia Mndebele (Esikhwameni now known as Themba Memorial Corps), James Sambo (Steenbok) and Makawosi Luka Shabangu (Emangweni Corps). As a young boy in my home corps Barberton, I saw these great people in action. They had no formal education nor training experience. But with God on their side they became the instruments by which Christ's message was carried to many places in the then Eastern Transvaal and beyond. I can count many highly educated people who were converted and became faithful soldiers of the Army through the leadership and ministry of these ordinary men. This happened because they were empowered by the Holy Spirit. "God chose what the world looks down on and despises, and thinks is nothing, in order to destroy what the world thinks is important"(1 Cor. 1:26-29 GNB).

John MacArthur the writer of the book 'Twelve Ordinary Men' puts it clearly when he talks about the disciple of Jesus, "Not one of them was renowned for scholarship. They had no track record as orators or theologians. In fact, they were outsiders as far as the religious establishment of Jesus' day was concerned. They were not outstanding because of any natural talents or intellectual abilities. On the contrary, they were all too prone to mistakes, wrong attitudes, lapses of faith, and bitter failure." These are the twelve men who were equipped by the Holy Spirit to build the Church after Jesus had gone.

I believe that the same happened to these great warriors I am talking about. Their secret was that they were not working alone but their lives were guided and directed by God himself. Despite the challenging times, they pressed on. Despite their shortcomings, many lives were transformed. They worked without any remuneration but never complained. They opened their homes as places of worship. Children would come and play in their homes, they would never chase them away, instead they provided food, water and shelter for them. Whatever they had they shared it with The Salvation Army.

Envoy Themba, as a young man, left his home to look for work in Johannesburg where he was employed as a domestic worker. One Sunday morning he heard The Salvation Army band playing in one of the open air meetings. This is where he offered his life to Jesus and later was made a soldier in the then African Central corps in Mooi Street. Since he could not write and read, he attended the night schools and from there onward he was able to read his Bible and to write letters to his family. After sometime he decided to return home. When he arrived home his family excepted that he would bring gifts and money that would change their lives for better. But instead Shimungana brought home Bibles and books which were going



to help him start the work of The Salvation Army in his home village. This was the beginning of great things and the three men and their wives joined him in laying the solid foundation.

Most of the time when Mirriam and I were on furlough we would visit the Envoys and they would share many interesting stories with us. At the same time giving us words of wisdom and encouragement. Envoy Sambo once told us how they travelled with bicycles from Komatipoort to Swaziland, Ermelo and as far as Lydenburg which is now called Mashishing collecting

for The Salvation Army the then General and Social Appeal. Wherever they went they made sure that they communicated the good news of the gospel to the people they meet. This is how the work was spread to many places. As they went to different places they did not have proper or arranged accommodation, they would sleep in someone's garage or in any shelter and the next morning they would continue with their work for the Army they loved.

During Youth Councils these old men would come with their young people to Emangweni from Steenbok and Themba Memorial. Those days there was no transport, they would walk and as they walk, they would be singing and beating the drum. They will be leading their young people with great joy and enthusiasm.

Envoy Mndebele once told us how the work was nearly closed down because some of the leaders from Johannesburg felt that the work was not growing as it was expected. The decision was taken that the work will be closed down. In his response the Envoy said, "You can take your books and other things but we will continue with the work of God in this area. Our homes will be opened for people to come and worship. We shall go out in the streets to proclaim the message of the risen Christ and God will honour his work". Words of faith and courage, indeed God honoured his work. Today the Army is still growing from strength to strength, this is because of the man who had faith in God. The first Army hall in that area was built at Emangweni under the leadership of Envoy Shabangu and from there onward the work spread to many places.

It was through these men that many young men and women were sent to the Training College to be trained as officers of The Salvation Army. The Envoys were aware that proper training was going to sustain the work and also equip the workers for the service of God.

I can write many pages about these heroes of faith. Trust you have been inspired and encouraged by their stories. May the Spirit of Christ who taught them transform us the way he transformed them, into precious vessels fit for the Master's service. May we learn from their example what it means to be true disciples of Jesus and people filled and empowered by the Holy Spirit.

Siyabonga maqhawe eVangeli! Thank you our pioneers, veterans and heroes. May we all who are working in the Lord's vineyard remember the words of Prophet Zechariah "Not by might nor by power, but by my spirit, says the Lord Almighty" (Zechariah 4:6). It is only the Holy Spirit that can help us to do what God wants us to do.

Introduction

The Boundless 2015 congress is over and although I was unable to attend I followed diligently online most of the significant meetings. I was particularly moved and inspired by the spirited message of the General on Sunday and felt challenged, as most Salvationists, to live a practical Christian life. We have been challenged to become one with the poor and needy, the destitute and those who are hurting; do something in fulfilling the Great Commission of God. I believe that this boundless experience has shaped The Salvation Army back to reality; back to the future. I have been challenged earnestly to live and preach the Gospel message. I am committed and seeking to live a Holy Life acceptable to God, in His service.

Throughout the Congress and in conversations, the song of the founder William Booth resonates loudly around The Army world. I believe that when William Booth wrote these verses, he was caught up in a moment/vision. It was a special moment when God inspired him to pen these words of the song which has become an anthem in The Salvation Army. I purposely for this article would like to focus on two theological truths clearly stated his song. That is, God's Boundless Mercy and Grace.



We often speak of God's enabling grace and mercy. We would usually quote 2 Corinthians 12:9b 'My Grace is sufficient for you.' But we often use both grace and mercy interchangeably. William Booth speaks of God's mercy:

> "O ocean of mercy, oft longing I've stood... The tide is now flowing, I'm touching the wave, I hear the loud call of the Mighty to Save; My faith's growing bolder, delivered I'll be;"

Recognising that humanity is undeserving of God's grace and mercy; the founder believes that God's intention is to save humanity from sin and hell. He visualises a mighty Army rescuing the perishing and leading lost humanity to the light house....a place of redemption and deliverance; a place where the mercy and grace of God is sufficient to transform lives of despair into a life which leads into eternal happiness. Booth visualizes an Army forever on its knees seeking to be Holy as God is Holy; an undaunted Army marching on to war with the Sword of truth as its standard bearer (Blood and Fire!!!)

William Booth speaks of an Army totally reliable on God for a life-changing experience

I love the line of the verse that speaks of:

"O ocean of mercy, oft longing I've stood... The tide is now flowing, I'm touching the wave, I hear the loud call of the Mighty to Save; My faith's growing bolder, delivered I'll be;"

William Booth believed that God will deliver and redeem all humanity who will respond by repenting of their sins. The founder knows that we

merciful He will save us from sin and hell. The Word of God in Ephesians 2:8-9 reminds us, 'For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—not the result of works, so that no one may boast".

William Booth believes that all Salvationists are called to rescue the perishing. He believes that The Army is a vehicle to be used by God to help bring lost humanity to the point of receiving God's mercy and grace. An Army being defiant in the face of the enemy of our souls; against injustice, against poverty and many ills in our society today. Did the founder see into the future? Did he experience an epiphany? Well he could not have known that there would have been ruthless wars. barbaric acts of terrorism and the types of violence and crimes

pervading many societies today in the 21st century. But his song seems to have looked into the future.

William Booth's charged to all Salvationists

The Founder not only highlighted the need for God's grace and mercy for sinners; Booth charged all Salvationist in his song to experience God's cleansing blood. "Beneath thy blest billows deliverance I see, O come, mighty ocean, and roll over me!" The founder is saying that God's mercy is life-giving. God's mercy is soul-cleansing. We all tend to carry burdens through life. Extra baggage that weighs us down. God's mercy provides a way for us to unload our baggage. Hebrews 10:1-2 speaks of Jesus' sacrifice that cleanses us once and for all. Jesus' sacrifice, such atonement cleanses us of the shame of sin. The mighty ocean flowing and rolling over us is the Holiness of God completely covering us. Without this complete covering we will not be cleansed. As Salvationists, the Holiness of God must flow out of us affecting lives we influence. 2 Peter 1:3-9 reminds us that Holy living flows out of us who having been cleansed by God. We must grow in Holiness through our awareness of God who has cleansed us from our sins.

4. The Whole World Being redeemed

The finally:

"And now, hallelujah! The rest of my days Shall gladly be spent in promoting his praise Who opened his bosom to pour out this sea Of boundless salvation for you and for me."

The founder is saying that a new experience of redemption and a new life in Christ demands a natural response of praise and worship. A born again Christian is not to become just another spectator, but should be excited and over joyed, eager to spread the gospel so that others can have that same experience of God's boundless love; God's Boundless Salvation.

So the Founder's song calls all Salvationists into action.

I believed that the BOUNDLESS 2015 experience challenges all Salvationists to be active in fulfilling the Great Commission.

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The Salvation Army's Positional Statement on Human Trafficking

The Salvation Army believes that all people are made in the image of God and that each person in the eyes of God has equal worth and dignity. It has from its inception applied Biblical principles to the moral and social challenges experienced by humanity and society, believing that the liberating message of Josus Christ meets the total need of humanishind.

With this in mind, The Salvation Army rejects Human Trafficking as it refers to the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, abduction, fraud, deception and abuse of power for the purpose of sexual exploitation or forced labour. Trafficking may involve slavery or servitude in any industry, such as forced or coerced participation in agriculture, manufacturing, postitution and other commercial ast industries, domestic servitude or service marriage. This also refers to the unlawful removal of organs.

In cooperation with other agencies, The Salvation Army acknowledges its Christian responsibility to be actively engaged in the prevention of human trafficking, the protection of the victims (especially the children) and the lawful prosecution of the perpetrators. Recognizing that the fight against Illuman Trafficking is closely linked with the fight for social justice, The Salvation Army will continue to address the underlying issues resited in poverty, unemployment, gender inequality and inadequate education.



THERE was a buzz of anticipation as Salvationists packed into The O2 arena for the seventh – and final – session of Boundless 2015. Contributions by the International Staff Band (ISB), International Staff Songsters (ISS) and Mannssambandet prepared the way for worship with an emphasis on the Holy Spirit, further enhanced by multimedia, dance and vocal soloist Ayoung Lee with 'Send the Fire'.

The screens displayed an international Army at prayer, and the sound of prayer continued as three delegates prayed in their respective languages before the Chief of the Staff (Commissioner William A. Roberts) drew the prayers together and asked God to 'help us to listen' and 'help us to respond'.

In a spirit of worship, Vasa Gospel choir sang with energy and sincerity 'Great Is the Lord'. Ayoung Lee then started to sing the great hymn 'Holy, Holy, Holy' and was joined by a virtual choir of Salvationists from around the world whose individual images — supplied online — appeared on the screens. The virtual choir was swelled by the capacity congregation in the arena to create a great paean. Congress-goers were left in no doubt about the great universal company of Salvationists who were also praising God with them at that time.

General André Cox introduced William Flinn, of Pasadena Tabernacle Corps in the USA Western Territory, whose service has included many years of music leadership. He is the first soldier to be inducted onto the National Advisory Board of America and, in his role as President of the Pasadena Tournament of Roses, his witness is known. His service exemplifies the spirit of Christian excellence in spreading the gospel message, and the General admitted him to the Order of the Founder, the highest Salvation Army award.

The General then told the congregation that in this anniversary year it was right that recognition should be given to a UK Salvationist. He invited Divisional Envoy Iris Jones (Murton) to join him, saying: 'She has led the corps with strength of will, determination and almost single-handedly for 30 years, maintaining a busy schedule of activities including public house ministry three evenings a week. She continues to look at new ways to make the gospel attractive and relevant.' During this time she has not been paid an allowance or salary of any kind. For her ministry of sacrificial service and continued Kingdom impact, the General admitted Iris Jones to the Order of the Founder.

Selected Scripture was spoken in various languages before the ISB contributed 'The Kingdom Triumphant' with the powerful reminder of the song 'Lo! He Comes With Clouds Descending'.

The Bill Booth Theater Company focused on the subject of integrity in their sketch 'Hold it Up to the Light'. Using the example of a cracked pot being presented as perfect, the question was asked: 'If your life and heart were held up to the light would there be cracks?' The sketch concluded with the thought that God

flows through the broken places to others.



A multimedia display depicted the General's dream for the Army, on which the main congress sessions were based, after which people were asked to consider what they needed to do to make the ideas of the dream a reality.

'What has this celebration been all about?' asked the General, and 'What is going to change? What is God calling you to do?' He said the dream will only become a reality when lives are transformed by the Holy Spirit and that holiness is the visible sign of salvation.

'We must be totally committed and dedicated to the task assigned to us,' he said. 'If we're convinced of our call we will live lives fully surrendered to God. Our worship needs to be more than speaking or listening to God. It must be about total surrender. We need a sense of urgency in a world where there is so much injustice and need.'

He then referred to Vachel Lindsay's poem 'General William Booth Enters Into Heaven' with its images of people washed in the blood and the Army at war against darkness and despair, saying: 'This is something that must engage every one of us. I fear we have become comfortable, contented and settled and detached from the reality of world suffering.'

He reminded everyone: 'All have sinned – this was why God sent us a Saviour. Too many people are living in poverty and exclusion, too many are lonely.' Referring to the vision of William Booth depicted in the iconic 'Darkest England' poster, he said: 'We see Salvationists manning the lifeboats and rescuing those in the seas ... We are still an Army that rescues those who are damaged by life ... Our lives can point people to Christ ... All our programmes are but a gateway to the hearts and minds of people.'

he General went on to remind listeners that there are no limits to what God can do in individual lives. 'This is boundless salvation,' he said. 'A total surrender of our lives and the total commitment to the mission.' These challenging words were followed by the ISS with 'Bow the Knee'.

The Chief reminded listeners of the General's call to action and asked: 'What is God saying to you right now?' Many people engaged in prayerful moments of commitment, some moving forward to kneel at the cross-shaped mercy seat. In leading 'O Boundless Salvation!' the Chief asked that this song might take on a new or fresher meaning.


The finale delivered a focus on God's Kingdom with 'They Shall Come from the East, They Shall Come from the West'. Participants were clad in white versions of international clothes as, with special effects and even circus-style acrobatics, Boundless 2015 was brought to a fitting and spectacular conclusion.

Earlier the General had acknowledged the roles played in organising the congress by Commissioner William Cochrane (International Secretary to the Chief of the Staff), Lieut-Colonels Eddie and Kathy Hobgood and all the technicians who made the theme of Boundless a reality.

Commissioner Cochrane closed the session – and the congress – with a benediction assigning all the glory to God.

Galatians 3 Salvation comes by faith, not through observing the

Do you know people who say they hope they are good enough to be saved (to get to Heaven)?

Do you ever take time to consider that God loves you regardless of how faithful and obedient you are?

Is it tempting to think that salvation can be earned through being good Christians?

Why is it important to recognise that our effort cannot help earn our salvation?

Salvation comes by grace through faith alone. Although this is true, can it be a difficult doctrine to accent?

1 Thessalonians 4 Paul reminds the Thessalonians about the Resurrection and the Rapture

Why do you think Paul refers to the dead as those who 'sleep' (v 13)? 'According to the Lord's word' (v 15). Is there any record of this? If not, can we presume that Jesus provided teaching on the Resurrection that is not recorded?

Are we led to believe that the 'dead' in Christ' have already been resurrected and are living in Heaven, or is this a future event (v 13-16)?

The Latin word for being 'caught up' is *raptus*, which is where the word 'rapture' comes from, when talking about our resurrection and being taken to Heaven (v 17).

What are the similarities between verses 13-18 and 1 Corinthians 15:51, 52? Some people believe that there will be a future event when God will resurrect those who have died trusting in Christ and take them to Heaven. This will be accompanied by the rapture of living believers into Heaven. Is there any other way of interpreting these verses?

1 Thessalonians 5 The timing of the Day of the Lord is unknown; we are to be ready

What do you think the 'day of the Lord' in verse 2 refers to? Sunday, the Rapture, the Resurrection, the second coming of Christ, or the last days before God's final judgement?

2 Thessalonians 1 Paul gives thanks for the faith of his readers

Is your love for others 'increasing' (v 3)

2 Thessalonians 2 Paul talks about a future 'lawless one' who will oppose God (vy 1-12)

Do the 'man of lawlessness' (v 3) and the' lawless one' (v 8) appear to be a literal person or a vague concept or symbol?

What is 'the truth' to which Paul is referring (v 13)?

2 Thessalonians 3 Paul asks for prayer and warns against idleness

Why do you think Paul wrote this (v 6)?

'Never tire of doing what is good' (v 13)!

What is Paul's advice to those who do not follow his teaching and why does he suggest it (v 15)?

1 Timothy 1 Paul encourages Timothy to oppose false teachers

If Timothy is being given authority to 'command certain people not to teach false doctrines' (v 3), does this mean that there was false teaching actually within the Church?

Is there any act mentioned in this list (v 9-11) which you would not consider to be a sin? If so, why?

Paul claims that he is a sinner saved through Christ (v 15-17). If he is the 'worst' and yet can be saved, what does this tell us about the other sins mentioned in verses 9-11?

1 Timothy 2 Timothy receives instructions on attitudes to worship

Is Paul demonstrating sexism or are these instructions (v 11-15) based on Jewish traditions and order in worship? Can these verses be reconciled to modern worship? Is Paul referring to the fact that Eve was an ancestor of Jesus Christ (v 15)?

1 Timothy 3 Instructions for choosing overseers and deacons Do verse 1-13 describe you?

1 Timothy 4 Timothy is encouraged to 'watch his life and doctrine closely' (v 16)

Paul tells Timothy to train himself spiritually, just as he would physically (vv 7, 8). How is your spiritual 'fitness'? Has your stamina and strength improved in the past 12 months?

Do you ever dismiss the advice and teaching of those younger than you? What does verse 12 say?

Could your 'life and doctrine' be rephrased as 'holiness and belief' (v 16)?

Why does Paul think doctrine is so important? Is it important to you?
